

Sports Premium Impact Statement 2014-2015

Through the 'Sport Premium' the Government has provided £150 million over two academic years (2013-14 & 2014-15) to support the delivery of PE and sport in primary schools.

This funding is ring fenced and allocated directly to primary schools across England, providing them with funds to buy in invaluable expertise and support. Primary schools are able to determine what they believe to be the most appropriate use of this funding. Each school receives £8,000 plus an extra £5 per pupil.

At Howletch Lane Primary School our Sport Premium allocation for **2014** - **2015** is £9,326.

We have used this money in the following ways:

SLA Programme with School Sports Partnership	£5000	 Access to a full, organised annual programme of competitions/tournaments and festivals in the local area which school could not provide alone Access to inclusion opportunities for our Resource Base pupils Provision of CPD for staff in teaching physical education (e.g. twilights, PD days NQT support, team teaching, mentoring) Broadening pupils' experiences in sport through the provision of a minimum of 4 x 6 week blocks of curriculum and / or after-school activity in a variety of sports. Employ a representative from Sunderland football club to provide a weekly session in school working with all age groups from Nursery (EY) up to Year 6.	£1,520 (curriculum coaching) + £760 for after school club	Support in the promotion and development of links to local sports clubs (SAFC) thus increasing the range of physical activities available to pupils during and after school. These sessions help to develop basic ball control skills, games skills, cooperation and teamwork.
Subsidise a camping trip experience involving at least one overnight stay for Year 6. (Dukeshouse Wood May 2015)	£ 1,500	Allowing all pupils irrespective of background to experience a three day residential trip which enables their social skills and team building skills to develop and also gives pupils the opportunity to try activities such as climbing, abseiling, archery, assault course, Jacob's ladder, Bushcraft and shelter building thus improving confidence levels and encouraging independence.
 Provide Bushcraft / Survival skills training on site for Year 5. (Kingsway are the providers this year, June 2015) 	£500	As an introduction to survival skills and in preparation for the Year 6 residential trip, all of Year 5 experience a day of team building involving building shelters and fires on the school field. This helps pupils to become more independent and confident whilst learning in the outdoors.
Pay for extra swimming SLA to enable more KS2 pupils to achieve 25 metres swimming award before they leave primary school	£2,400 SLA + £1,600 transport cost	Improved water confidence. More opportunities for pupils to learn to swim and pass the required distance of 25 metres. Year 6 pupils who had not achieved this distance previously to attend weekly sessions during Summer term. This is in addition to the Year 4 / 5 classes who will be attending this year.
 Extend extra curricular clubs involving sport 	£500	Funding this after school programme has had a huge impact not only on the pupils themselves but also on their

programme		after school swimming, boxing, spinning and other team activities at local venues and has allowed many pupils to develop a more positive self image and to grow in confidence. Parents have also commented on the positive impact this programme has had on whole families with regard to exercise, diet and self esteem.
 Pay for professional development opportunities for teachers in PE and sport. (CPD courses) 	£600	Develop skills and confidence in those staff who have embarked on this training and professional development.

As illustrated above, the money allocated to the above activities extends well above the Sports Premium amount. However, we believe the impact of spending extra money in this way is very worthwhile and has had huge benefits to the pupils and the school community as a whole.
